

State of the City - Balancing Act

On April 27, 2009, the Chowchilla City Council directed the implementation of **work furloughs** for all City employees, with the exception of Public Safety. Employees are now observing a mandatory unpaid furlough day every other Friday that began May 1 and will continue through June. All City offices, except Public Safety, were closed on three Fridays in May and will be

closed on June 12 & June 26. The City Council and staff have been vigilant with the current fiscal crisis to strictly monitor the ratio of revenue to expenses. The 2008/09 budget was approved originally reflecting an increase in revenues of \$4,500. However, during mid-year budget review, the most recent Treasurer's Report showed a projected deficit of \$181,000 in the amended

budget. The deficit is due to routine annual revenue sources that were anticipated to be received in the areas of property tax, sales tax, licenses and permits, but fell short. The City is actively seeking all possible revenue sources available through federal stimulus monies, grants, or other government programs to ensure the financial stability of the City. Updates will continue monthly.



Summer in the City

In order to adjust services to work within the reduced budget, many summer programs will undergo some changes this season. Here's a brief update:

☼ **Community Pool:** There will not be daily open swim or lap swim, however there will be special community swim days once every week

or two. A swim lesson program is being offered weekday afternoons beginning the week of June 15.

☼ **Summer Chillin':** This popular day camp program for children ages 5-12 will be conducted beginning in mid-June. The week-long camps run from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. daily and include a free lunch.

☼ **Adult Softball:** Team registrations are now being accepted for both Co-Rec & Men's Softball. The team cost is \$395. Games will run from mid-June thru early August.

Safe Pools, Spas and Hot Tubs Save Lives

Building safety codes are life savers. International Code Council codes include specific provisions to make pools and spas safe:

FENCES:

- * Install a fence at least 4 feet high around the pool area.
- * Install a self-latching gate or

door in the fence to make pool areas inaccessible to children and non-swimmers. * Spas and hot tubs should have a similar fence or an approved, lockable cover.

DOOR ALARM:

Install a door alarm. When the door or gate is opened,

the alarm sounds and acts as an early warning device.

POOL ALARM:

Install a pool alarm to detect accidental or unauthorized entrance into the water.

Ask the City: Swine Flu/H1N1 Virus

What is the status of Swine flu cases locally? *E.H., Chowchilla*

As of 05/19/09 there is one confirmed case of H1N1 (swine flu) and two probable cases in Madera County. The symptoms of swine flu are

similar to seasonal flu and include fever, headache, cough, sore throat, body aches, chills and fatigue. If you or your family have these symptoms, you should stay home and call your health care provider to determine if you need medical attention. This flu strain is milder than first thought, so normal flu precautions should be taken. To prevent spread of respiratory

illnesses, cover your nose and mouth with a tissue when you cough or sneeze, wash your hands often with soap and water, and avoid close contact with sick people. The California Dept. of Public Health has set up a toll-free hotline to provide up-to-date information. The number is 1-888-865-0564, Mon.- Friday, from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. and on weekends from 8 a.m. until 4 p.m.

Berenda Reservoir Closed

Berenda Reservoir will not be open this summer season due to current economic conditions and the lack of water availability. The City Council made this difficult decision to ensure that core City services continue to be provided for our residents. Opening the reservoir would obligate the City to spend funds

preparing and maintaining the site, and to provide emergency response services during the season. Although Berenda Reservoir will be closed, residents are reminded of close access to Yosemite Lake in Merced, and the Eastman and Hensley Lakes in the foothills for recreational purposes.

Water Conservation

How many of us stop and think about the water we are using? Most of us don't give it much thought. To date, the City of Chowchilla has been able to keep the water service rates at a level that is lower than many areas of the state due to the fact that we are not billed based on consumption. Because of that, we sometimes tend to

ignore the amount of water we actually use. **Our water supplies are in jeopardy.** The Chowchilla Water District recently conducted a measurement of 75 wells in the area and found the water level dropped from 8 to 40 feet in the last year. As the water table drops, quality can be affected, the cost to pump increases and ground

absorption can occur. **What we do makes a BIG difference.** Take shorter showers, follow the irrigation regulations, look for low flow water conserving devices when purchasing appliances, and keep your private water lines in good repair. Let's all pitch in to conserve this precious resource and help keep our water affordable.

United States Census 2010 **Address Canvassers Take to the Streets**

The **2010 Census** began their preliminary wave of address canvassing in March which will conclude late June. During this canvass, the Census Bureau put 140,000 people to work covering all known streets and roads throughout the country. The canvassers will identify every living quarter where people live and verify more than 145 million addresses. For the first time in Census history, Census workers will confirm, add, and delete addresses using a GPS-equipped hand held computer. Each building will receive Global Positioning System (GPS) coordinates to make sure it is recorded in the right location. Workers will also update maps by adding new roads. This work ensures everyone gets counted!
